

## Impact Report Pupil Premium 2017-2018

Pupil premium funding was spent effectively to improve outcomes for our disadvantaged children.

Our funding priorities for 2017-18 fell into 4 key areas:

### 1. Outcomes for pupils

- Booster groups
- 1:1 interventions
- Speaking & Listening interventions

#### EYFS

- Reception intervention support

### 2. Quality of teaching & learning and assessment

- CPD – led/support by the Ivy Learning Trust
- Bespoke support staff training
- Fischer Family Trust (FFT)
- Pupil Premium Grant (PPG chn) identified on planning

### 3. Personal development, behaviour and welfare

- Horse Riding lessons
- Learning mentor

### 4. Effectiveness of leadership and management

- PPG training

## Learning and the Curriculum

### EYFS

At the end of Reception 50% of our pupil premium pupils achieved a Good Level of Development compared to a national score of 72% for 'all' children.

### Phonics

80% of pupil premium pupils reached the expected standard in the phonics screening check at the end of Year 1 and by the end of Year 2, 63% of pupil premium pupils reached the expected standard.

### End of KS1

A significantly lower percentage of pupil premium pupils achieved ARE in the core subjects; 56% reading, 67% writing, 56% maths and 56% science. This is clearly an area of consideration for our Raising Achievement Plan RAP 2018-19.

### End of KS2

The attainment of pupil premium (PP) pupils at the end of KS2 continues to be an area to consider. The percentage of PP pupils achieving ARE in reading, writing and GPS is lower than the national figure for *all* pupils.

## Parents and Families

Through the pupil premium funding, we were able to continue to promote and develop partnerships with parents. We held Family Learning Days whereby parents came into school and worked alongside their children. We also had an Art exhibition and parent information sessions. These were hugely successful with a large number of pupil premium family members attending and providing us with very positive feedback.

### Attendance

We used some of the pupil premium money to fund our attendance initiatives. These included funding to set up rewards for children when attendance was good and/or better. The attendance of our pupil premium children saw a slight increase from 2016-17 (94.4%) to 2017-18 (94.8%).

## Social and Emotional Support

### Pastoral Support

The Pupil Premium Grant was used to fund our pastoral support work whereby children were able to go horse riding throughout the year. This benefitted eight children during the year.

## Enrichment

We used a variety of bespoke enrichment initiatives to support our pupil premium pupils. These include free or subsidised breakfast and after school club places for targeted families, extra-curricular activities through our school clubs programme and also a range of trips and experiences to further enrich and extend our PP pupils.
